

APRIL


Our third annual Tolle Lege Day raises a record \$480,000 for the Augustinian Friars and their ministries.






SUPPORT FOR THE UNDERSERVED AND DISENFRANCHISED

This coffee cart will allow those recently released from incarceration to gain the job skills they need to re-enter society.
